College so far as taught me more than you could know. I currently hold an Associate's Degree in Drug and Alcohol Rehab, and I am 3 semesters into my Bachelor's Degree. Thanks to my pastor and many others that never gave up on me I am where I am today. Lord willing I will go far in life.

When asked if I would change anything in my life I replied "NO!" These are the things that make me who I am today. Today I love who I am and that's not going to change. I struggle with bills but they get paid. I am not complaining. My wife and I being both homeless at one time know how to prioritize things in our lives. So we continue to work in a forward and positive direction. We are actually below the poverty line. We have a roof over our head and food in our fridge thanks to food stamps. Action energy takes care of our heat. I am in college so I can get out of this rut my wife and I are in. Massachusetts Rehabilitation also helps me get by as well as federal grants. I am the first person in my family to earn an Associate's Degree, and completing the program at NECC has been a huge accomplishment for me. I am also extremely excited to be able to say that I was chosen for the honor of being this year's student speaker at the Commencement Ceremony. Being able to share my story with the thousands of people who attended the graduation ceremony was an amazing experience that I will never forget. Now that I have earned my Associate's Degree, I plan to transfer to Salem State University, located in Salem Massachusetts, in order to work towards earning my Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood Education. My ultimate goal is to earn my Master's Degree in Early Childhood Education, and become a licensed, lead teacher in a public kindergarten. I am a very dedicated and hard-working student. I pride myself on maintaining a good work ethic, and also helping others whenever possible.



When I enrolled in NECC in 2011, I never would have imagined that I would now be preparing to transfer to a four-year university in pursuit of my Bachelor's Degree. As a single mom, my finances are always very tight, and as much as I wanted to earn my Bachelor's Degree, I simply did not think that it was something that I could afford to pursue. NECC has taught me that it's ok to dream big, and advancing to a four-year school is a very big dream of mine. I am very grateful that Salem State University has approved me for various federal grant awards. I am been approved for a federal SEOG Grant, a Mass Grant and a Federal Pell Grant. I also qualify for the Mass Transfer Program, which includes a tuition waiver. At this time, I have not been awarded any time of scholarship funds. While the grant monies that I have been awarded will cover much of my college expenses, they will not cover all expenses and as a single mother I cannot afford to enroll in a payment plan. If chosen for the MEOA Scholarship, I would use the award towards the expenses of textbooks, transportation costs, any remaining tuition fees, and the required supplies needed for my college courses. As my daughter and I currently reside in Haverhill, MA, I am expecting my transportation costs to be high, as I will be commuting to Salem daily.

Through my involvement at NECC and also in my community, I have been able to grow my leadership skills, and I have also experienced many priceless moments through working with young children. During the past two years, I was employed with the JumpStart Program through NECC's work-study program. Through this program, college students work with preschool-aged children in the schools that are located in low-income areas, to work towards strengthening the children's literacy skills. I have become very involved in the NECC community, which has been an absolutely wonderful experience. I completed the first level of the

Student Leadership Development Program, which included completing a minimum of fifteen hours of community service and also attending various workshops to build my leadership skills. I completed my service hours at Emmaus House, a family homeless shelter in Haverhill, MA. At Emmaus House, I worked with the STEP Program, which included providing the children who reside at the shelter with tutoring assistance and also providing various arts and crafts activities for the younger children. I enjoyed volunteering at Emmaus House so much that I decided to go above and beyond the required fifteen hours of service, instead completing over six months of service at the shelter. I have now also completed the second level of the Student Leadership Development Program, which is entitled the Presidential Student Ambassadors Program. The requirements for this program include completing a minimum of fifty service hours at NECC, by helping out with various events that take place over the academic year. I recently volunteered at the MCC Conference that NECC hosted on Professional Day. It was a great day and an amazing experience that I would never have been a part of without the Student Leadership Development Program. It has been a very rewarding experience, giving back to the NECC community and to the community in which I live. I absolutely intend to become very involved in the Salem State University campus community as well.

Through my involvement in the Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society, and also the student leadership Development Program, I learned many important leadership skills, which I feel is an important part of becoming a successful educator. Serving as the President of Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society has been a huge honor, and it has been really exciting to brainstorm with other PTK members about how we can help out in our community and make a positive impact. I am also a member of the PACE (Pathways to Academic and Career Excellence) Program at NECC. This program has been incredibly helpful in many ways, including assistance with developing important career skills and tools, assistance with course registration, and also just giving me moral support when I needed it the most.

As a single mother, and full-time college student, I have certainly encountered my fair share of challenges, but I feel that these challenges have helped to shape me into the dedicated, driven student that I am today. Returning to school many years after graduating from high school has certainly not been an easy road. I have worked harder in the past three years that I have spent at NECC than I would have thought was possible, and I wouldn't want it to be any other way. Yes, it is challenging to be a full-time student and a single parent, and yes, as a full-time college student, my budget is incredibly tight; but I feel that my life experiences and my daughter give me even more motivation to strive for excellence in my studies. Life is full of challenges, but I feel that it is important for one to be able to rise to the occasion.

Other students have asked me my secret to doing well in school. I don't feel that I have a secret, really, I just work hard. Being a high school dropout is something I was once ashamed of but it wasn't until my first semester at Northern Essex Community College when I received my grades and realized what an accomplishment it truly was. In high school, I had faced copious family issues and in particular the ones that were most difficult to deal with took control of my mental state, which distracted me from my education.

My brother had been ill of the heart, a pre-teen child of the age of just 10 who had open heart surgery from one of the rarest diseases the doctors have no cure for. My family's financial and mental state was in disarray and taking care of one another was a priority instead of an option. Due to the unfortunate circumstance in my junior year of high

school, I dropped out to tend to my family's needs. This was a difficult decision and I had promised myself that whenever I was given the opportunity again, I would return to high school and commit to my education; a year later I did just that. I had the desire to persevere and this time I would finish my high school experience stronger than anyone would ever anticipate.

My senior year of high school began great but ended with a tragic death in the family. On December 27th, 2011 my father passed away. I would not let another tragedy impede my education and, though it was one of the most difficult moments of my life, I knew that my father would want me to graduate. With this in mind on June 1, 2012, as I walked across the stage with my cap and gown, I told myself that that moment was monumental and I would dedicate it to my father.

Although I graduated from high school at the bottom of my class, I graduated at my community college at the very top with a GPA of 3.7 and the completion of the Commonwealth Honors program. I know that my ability to overcome obstacles comes from tough experiences and having a profound amount of faith and because of this, I believe that success for me is attainable. I plan on pursuing a Bachelor's Degree in political science and then after I plan on attending law school. It would be truly astonishing to know that MEOA would be a part of my educational journey both financially and supportively.

By becoming so heavily involved in student life, I have managed to meet so many students and faculty from the NECC community. I joined clubs like Amnesty International, Students for a Democratic Society, PACE-TRiO, Phi Theta Kappa, Student Senate, Contemporary Affairs, Student Leadership Development, and the Presidential Student Ambassadors program. Being president of Amnesty International, I have learned so much about global human rights and I had the pleasure of planning and going on a trip to New York City to volunteer for Hurricane Sandy cleanup. As president of Student Senate, I have advocated for solutions to issues that concern the students and faculty such as lowering the cost of textbooks on campus. Such efforts on my behalf have been recognized by the Governor of Massachusetts when I was selected to be one of the "29 Who Shine" at the State House on May 8th, 2014.

I have applied to three institutions and my financial package is complete from UMass Amherst. George Washington University and UMass Boston have not yet sent me my financial aid package for Fall 2014. This insecurity regarding my finances for next semester reassures me that the MEOA scholarship will help me financially, but it is also a scholarship that emphasizes students who have excelled in their education opportunity program and overcome obstacles. Undoubtedly, the MEOA scholarship represents all that I stand for.
